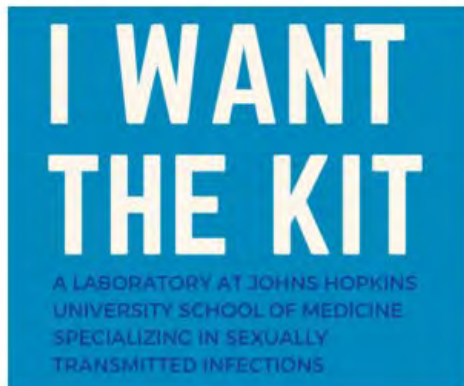

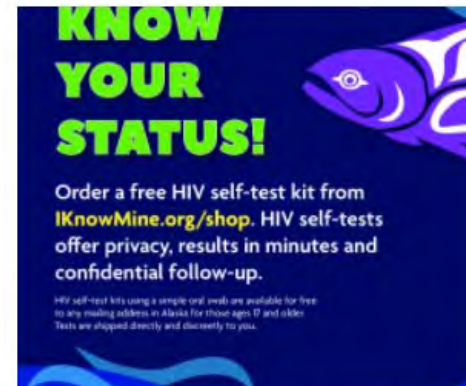

c

chlamydia

is a common sexually transmitted disease (STD) that can cause permanent damage to a woman's reproductive system.

g

gonorrhea

an easily shared sexually transmitted disease (STD) caused by the gonococcus bacteria - also called "the clap."

h

hpv:

(human papillomavirus) is the most common sexually transmitted infection (STI) in the United States. It can cause cancer and genital warts.

s

syphilis:

a disease shared through sexual touch that can cause lifelong damage.

h

herpes

is a sexually transmitted disease (STD) caused by two types of viruses: Herpes simplex type 1 virus and herpes simplex type 2.

h

hiv:

(Human Immunodeficiency Virus) can lead to Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS).

t

trichomoniasis:

also called "trich," is a very common sexually transmitted disease caused by a parasite.

h

hepatitis C

a virus that can cause long-term damage to the liver and other organs.

BE 'PREP'ARED: PREVENT HIV WITH A DAILY PILL

IS PREP FOR ME?
If you answer yes to any question below, PrEP might be right for you.

- Do you use condoms sometimes or not at all?
- During condomless sex, are you a receptive partner (vaginal or anal)?
- Have you been treated recently for an STD, such as rectal gonorrhea?
- Are you trying to get pregnant with an HIV-positive partner?
- Do you/your sex partner(s) use or inject drugs?
- Do you/your sex partner(s) exchange sex for money, housing, drugs or other needs?
- Has your partner threatened or forced you to have sex against your will?

WHAT IS PrEP (Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis)?
PrEP is taking a once-a-day pill in case of exposure to the HIV virus. When taken correctly, everyday at the same time, PrEP can reduce your risk of HIV infection by 92%.

WHAT DOES PrEP DO?
PrEP prevents HIV infection before exposure by taking a pill everyday. Unlike PEP, PrEP can prevent HIV infection before being exposed to HIV.

IS PrEP FOR ME?
No! It is for people who are at risk of HIV infection.

HOW DO I GET PrEP?
Talk to your health provider. PrEP requires a prescription and blood tests to check your kidney function.

HOW MUCH DOES PrEP COST?
Insurance, Medicaid and patient assistance programs (fairpricingcoalition.org/projects/) can help cover costs.

iknowmine:

PEP IS "PLAN B FOR HIV"

WHAT IS PEP (Post-Exposure Prophylaxis)?
PEP can protect you from the HIV virus after being exposed. It requires taking prescription pills 1-2 times a day for 28 days. PEP must be started within 72 hours after exposure and is more effective the sooner it is started. When taken correctly PEP works very well to prevent HIV infection.

WHEN DO I USE PEP?
PEP is for emergency situations when you might be exposed to the HIV virus. This could be because of condomless sex without PrEP, condom breaking or being removed without consent, rape, sharing needles with others, or accidental needle stick.

HOW DO I GET PEP?
Talk to your health provider or go to an ER.

HOW MUCH DOES PEP COST?
Insurance, Medicaid and patient assistance programs (fairpricingcoalition.org/projects/) can help cover costs.

IS PEP FOR ME?
If you answer yes to any of these questions, PEP might be right for you: * Did a condom break when you were having sex with someone who's HIV positive or whose HIV status you don't know? * Were you forced into sex against your will? * Did you share injection drug equipment, like a syringe or needle? * Did you have condomless sex as the receptive partner (anal or vaginal)?

How STDs spread

- STDs are spread by bodily fluids or genital contact during anal, oral, and vaginal sex.
- Some STDs can be passed by skin-to-skin contact.
- Most STDs do not cause any noticeable signs or symptoms.

Common STDs

Chlamydia - Caused by bacteria. Infections can be cured with antibiotics.

Genital Herpes (HSV-2) - Caused by a virus. Infections can be treated but not cured.

Genital Warts (HPV) - Caused by a virus. Infections can be treated but not cured.

Gonorrhea - Caused by bacteria. Infections can be cured with antibiotics.

Syphilis - Caused by bacteria. Infections can be cured with antibiotics.

Trichomoniasis - Caused by a protozoa. Infections can be cured by antibiotics.

Hepatitis B (HBV) - Caused by a virus. There is a vaccine that can prevent HBV.

HIV and AIDS - Caused by a virus. Infections can be treated but not cured. Having other STDs can make it easier to pass on and get HIV.

STD stands for Sexually Transmitted Disease. They are sometimes called STIs (sexually transmitted infections).

Prevention

abstinence
This means not having vaginal, oral or anal sex. This is the best way to protect yourself. It is possible to get an STD even without having sex through skin-to-skin contact.

monogamy
If you have sex, choose only one partner who you know and trust. Limiting your number of sex partners helps reduce your risk of getting an STD.

condom
Use latex or polyurethane condoms for any type of sex (vaginal, oral, or anal) from start to finish. Condoms protect the penis, vagina, mouth or anus from some STDs, but they will not protect against genital warts (HPV) or other lesions such as herpes, when they are present.

Female condoms are made of thin latex or plastic (polyurethane – latex free) and can be placed in the vagina up to 8 hours before sexual contact. They cannot be used together with a male condom at the same time.

water-based lubricants
Always use water-based lubricants (like K-Y jelly) with latex condoms. Oil lubricants, like baby oil can cause latex condoms to break.

- STD self-testing kit for gonorrhea and Chlamydia
 - Trichomonas testing for female-bodied persons
 - Uses self-collected swabs
- The service began in 2004 in Baltimore through Johns Hopkins University.
- Shown to expand reach to high-risk groups
- Free for individuals in Alaska
- Mailed discreetly

- STD self-test ordered on iwantthekit.org

2

- Requestor is prompted to provide CLIA-required information
- Testing kit is mailed to address provided (vaginal, penile and rectal kits are available for ordering)

3

- Specimen is self-collected, put back in tube and placed in biohazard bag
- Contact information sheet is completed
- Everything is sent back in pre-paid envelope to Johns Hopkins University (JHU)

4

- JHU lab performs FDA approved Genprobe Aptima test for GC, CT and trichomonas
- JHU lab reports all results to ANTHC and positive results to the state as required by law

5

- ANTHC provider of record contacts positives and negatives to give results
- Positives are referred to treatment depending on their location and preference
- ANTHC provider of records reports positive results to the state as required by law

Language Matters

We can speak, write and think in a way that acknowledges the human being first, rather than their condition or disease.

- Use people-first language
- Use language that reflects the medical nature of substance use disorders
- Avoid negative slang

Suggested language:

- Person who uses drugs
- Substance use disorder
- Had a setback
- Maintained recovery

Medication-assisted Treatment (MAT) is the use of FDA approved medications alongside counseling and behavioral therapies to treat substance use disorders. The goal is to sustain recovery and to prevent or reduce opioid overdose. Research shows that MAT can improve patient survival, increase retention in treatment and reduce risk of contracting HIV or hepatitis C.

A Compassionate Approach to Drug Use

Harm Reduction



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People are more than their substance use. Harm reduction focuses on the whole person.



What is harm reduction?

Harm reduction is a public health philosophy that aims to minimize potential harms related to health, social and legal impacts associated with drug use, drug policies and laws.

It focuses on positive change, safety and working with people without judgment, discrimination, coercion, or requiring that individuals stop using drugs as a precondition for support.

Harm reduction meets people where they are at.

Common Risks

Sharing drug supplies and condomless sex puts people at risk for getting or transmitting infections.

HIV and AIDS - caused by a virus that attacks the immune system.

Hepatitis C (HCV) - a liver infection caused by a virus.

Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs) - caused by bacteria or viruses. STIs can increase your risk of HIV.

Reducing Risk:

- Don't share needles
- Test and get treated
- Communicate with sex partner(s) about testing
- Use condoms



Be Informed

People who use drugs can increase the likelihood of a long and healthy life by applying these harm reduction strategies:

Know Your Status

Having access to no or low-cost HIV, STI and HCV testing help people make informed health decisions. Talk with a provider about getting tested.

Order HIV self-tests from iknowmine.org/shop and test in a private setting of your choosing. Know your results in 40 minutes.

Order STI self-tests from IWantTheKit.org and test for chlamydia and gonorrhea in a private setting of your choosing. Know your results in as little as two weeks.

Harm reduction recognizes the humanity in people who use substances and aims to reduce the harms associated with substance use.

Be Prepared

There are ways to reduce the risk of contracting STIs, like using condoms.

Order safer sex supplies from iknowmine.org/shop, including free condoms and educational materials on sexual health and healthy relationships.

Reduce Risk of Overdose

Learn how to reverse an overdose: An opioid overdose happens when too much of a substance is taken, whether prescription, over-the-counter, legal or illegal. Know how to respond to an overdose involving opioids, including prescription opioids, heroin and synthetic opioids (like fentanyl), by taking a training at iknowmine.org/narcan.

Always carry Narcan® Nasal Spray (naloxone), a medication used to reverse the effects of an opioid overdose. Order a Narcan® Overdose Response Kit at iknowmine.org/shop.

Test all substances for fentanyl, a synthetic opioid about 50-100 times stronger than heroin. Detect the presence of fentanyl in substances by using a testing strip. By detecting fentanyl before use, people can make plans to reduce their risk for an overdose.

- Talking to teens about sensitive topics is never easy, but it's important to talk to them openly and honestly.
- Text the word "EMPOWER" to 97779 and you'll receive weekly text messages from Healthy Native Youth that offer culturally appropriate tips and resources
- Covering sexual health, pregnancy, STDs, and consent!



If you have had sex, it's important that you get tested. Finding out early gives you the best chance of curing or controlling the infection. You can also prevent most infections by using a condom every time you have sex and making sure that you and your partner have both been tested before you have sex.

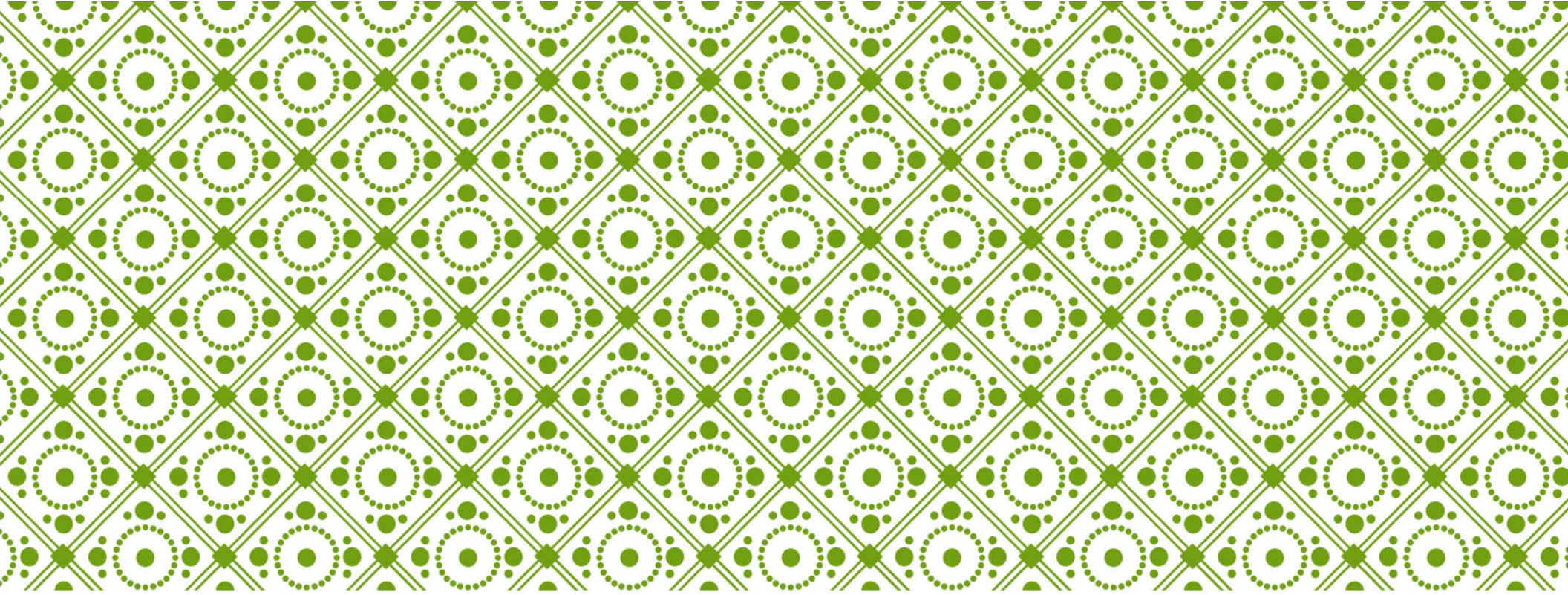

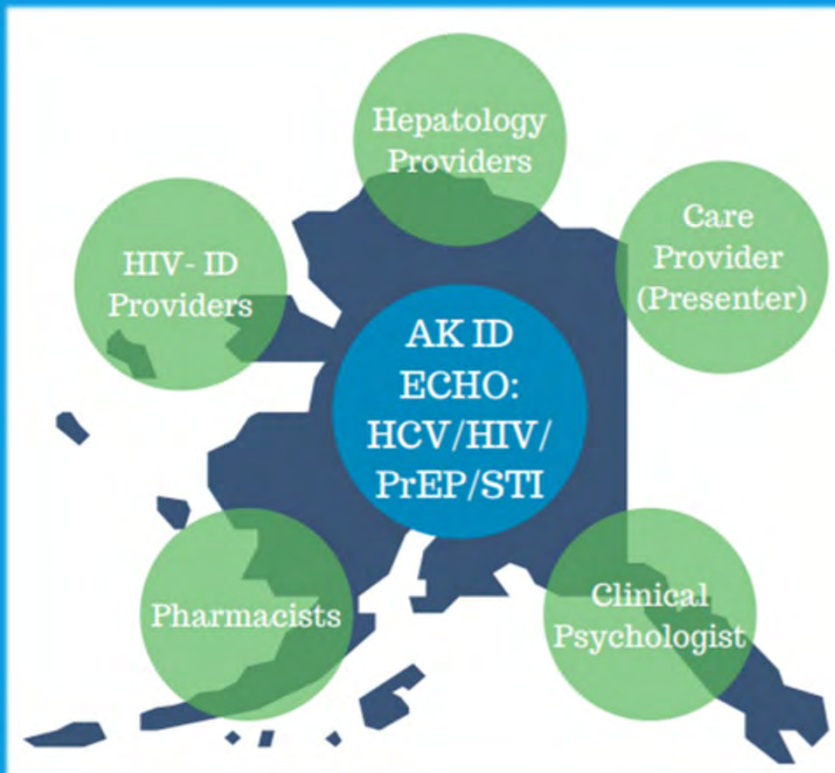
