"Let me speak directly to your Elders and tell them that it is very important for them to get vaccinated when the vaccine becomes available. First of all, the vaccine is highly efficacious and it is shown to be quite safe. Number two, that since you are an Elder you already are in a group that has a greater likelihood if you do get infected that you will have a serious outcome that could put you in the hospital and possibly even kill you. In addition, because you are elder, the chances are that you have an underlying condition such as diabetes, heart disease, lung disease, hypertension, kidney disease, that if you got infected you could have a severe outcome of COVID-19. So I'm asking you, for your own good and for those who love you, get vaccinated. It could be lifesaving to you as well as helping to make sure that this pandemic does not spread throughout your community."

"It's so important to get vaccines to the Native American population and when the vaccine becomes available to get as many of your individuals in the Tribal Nation vaccinated as you possibly can, as quickly as you can because it's a highly efficacious, and very safe vaccine. So I just wanted to get the opportunity to tell people in the Native American community why it's so important for their own health, for that of their family, and for that of their community to get vaccinated when vaccines become available."

"The community spirit among the Tribal Nations is such that when you have something that you realize is important for your health, for that of your family, and for that of your community – I know it's a close knit community – so perhaps that's one of the reasons why when something as life-saving as a vaccine comes along, the uptake of it is very smooth and very efficient, so in that respect I think the rest of the country might learn a lesson from how things have gone with the Tribal Nations."
